### Highlights from our 2016 Memorial Weekend Open House

Daniel S. Owen, great-great grandson of James F. McClure who is buried here, recently published his book, The Lost Rescue: Parallel Diaries of the Advance Party from the Lost Wagon Train of 1853. This book, based on years of field research as well as historical research, contains fascinating information regarding both the 1845 lost wagon train with Stephen Meek and the 1853 Lost Wagon Train with Elijah Elliott. As the title indicates, the book contains the diaries of 2 members of the Advance Party shown in parallel form.

Daniel, and his wife Donna, spent all 3 days over Memorial weekend at the cemetery. It was a 3-day book signing party, as well as a chance to have individual tours with information on the 18 members of the 1853 Lost Wagon Train who are buried at Luper Cemetery. Luper Cemetery has 24 copies to sell for \$15.00 each plus shipping. See our website for details.

Daniel also helped us put together a self-guided walking tour brochure. This provides

more information on our Veterans, the 18 members of the 1853 Lost Wagon Train, and a few additional community members.

In addition to having Daniel & Donna, the 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> Grade class of the Ridgeline Montessori School allowed us to display their school project. Under the instruction of Clint Moore, the class spent several months studying the Oregon Trail in a unique way. From an article by BRING Recycling: “To study Oregon’s pioneer history, his class role-played a four-month interstellar voyage based on the wagon train of 1843, which traveled from Independence, Missouri to Oregon City, Oregon.”



As a part of their study, they constructed an almost full sized Conestoga wagon from recycled materials. They did an awesome job on this project and we were thrilled to be able to have it for the weekend.

## More on our new Benches

Previous issues of our newsletter have mentioned the addition of benches to Luper Cemetery. A big part of this was due to Mother Nature in the form of the severe winter storm in February 2014. As a result of that storm, we now have 2 logs that we have turned in to our "Where-it-Fell" benches. Out of slabs of these logs that volunteers cut, Kyle Sorensen, of Boy Scout Troop #182, created 2 other benches. This was done as a part of his Eagle Scout certification.

We have spent time this summer sanding, staining, & sealing the seating portion of the logs. Kyle's benches will get the same treatment within the month. Be sure to try them out during your visit to the cemetery.

## Fossils and Bases

As you walk through the cemetery you will notice that there are several sandstone bases that are just sitting there. During the restoration process we found that many of the original bases were broken or too fragile to be used to hold the headstones. They were replaced by new bases.

Some of the broken bases revealed another treasure.... fossils! Recently volunteer Meredith Prochot contacted University of Oregon Professor of Geology, Mark Reed, to identify several rock types in the

cemetery. He consulted with Paleontologist Greg Retallack, also with the U of O. We learned that the bases are Eugene Formation sandstone containing fine to medium particles of rock fragments, mafic minerals, and feldspars. The sandstone has molds of the large surf clam *Spisula eugenensis*. Take a close look while you are touring the cemetery.
